



Girl Scout Ceremonies

- · Ceremonies are an important tradition in Girl Scouting
- Teach the girls what ceremonies are for and how they fit into them
- · There are no "Rules"
- Introduce them in a natural way, instead of a lesson that must be done
- · You might lead them at first

Flag Ceremonies

- · Can be big or small, simple or elaborate; indoor or outdoor
- · It's is a definitive "beginning" and "ending" to your activity
- Instills/Teaches respect for the Flag and Country
- · Work with what you have
 - · You don't need huge flags, on poles, with stands
 - · Sometimes your meeting location might have flags you can use
 - · You can use smaller flags on sticks
 - · You can do an opening and closing without flags
 - · Pledge of Allegiance
 - Promise and Law
 - Friendship Circle
 - Songs

Friendship Circles

- · Can begin or end a troop meeting
- · Informal way to share ideas
- · Indoor or outdoor

Investiture

- · Happens only one time in a Girl Scout's life
- · Does not need to be elaborate to be memorable
- · Girls receive their pins/tab at Investiture
- · Can be combined with a Rededication and Court of Awards
- · Adults should be "Invested" as well as girls

Rededication

- · Happens at the beginning of each program year
- · Does not need to be elaborate to be memorable
- Girls and adults "Rededicate" themselves to the Girl Scout Promise and Law
- · Can be combined with an Investiture and Court of Awards
- · Adults should be "Rededicated" as well as girls

Court of Awards

- · Does not need to be elaborate to be memorable
- Held several times a year
- · Girls can "show off" their accomplishments
- Girls may have a role in planning and conducting their ceremony – especially as they get older
- · Girls receive their badges, patches and pins
- May be held at the same time as Investiture, Rededication and/or Bridging

Bridging and Fly-up

- · Girls "Bridge" as they move from one level to another
- Brownies also Fly-up to Juniors and receive their Brownie Wings
 - Wings are not "earned" as long as a girl was a Brownie for any length of time, she is entitled to wear the Wings
 - · Wings may be worn on all successive uniforms
- The "ARC" bridge badge for each level is earned
- · Ceremony may be as simple or elaborate as the troop wants
- · May be combined with other ceremonies

Bronze, Silver and Gold Awards

- Bronze, Silver and Gold Award ceremony honors Girl Scouts who have earned these high awards
- · Our Council recognizes the girls at a Council Ceremony
- · Troop may also recognize their girls at a Troop Ceremony

Scout's Own

- · A girl led program
- Allows the girls to explore and express their feelings and beliefs around a topic
 - Example: The importance of friendship or the personal meaning they get from the Girl Scout Promise and Law
- May use spoken word, favorite songs, poetry or other methods of expression
- Not a religious ceremony

Ceremony Tips

- · Courts of Awards, Investitures, Rededications and Bridging
 - Always present the girl's awards attached to something with their name on it
 - Make sure to provide the parents information about where to put their awards on the vest/sash
 - · Don't worry about "Keeping up with the Jones"
 - · Sometimes Pinterest is not our friend!
 - Invite your troop families make it a family event!
 - · Encourage girls to invite whoever they want
 - · i.e., Subject matter experts who helped with badges or activities

Ceremony Tips

- · Courts of Awards, Investitures, Rededications and Bridging
 - · Don't forget to recognize the adults who volunteer with your troop
 - · Adults who are recognized are more likely to volunteer again
 - · It helps the other parents to see where help might be needed
 - · It's good for the girls to see parents recognized
 - Let your families help with refreshments, set up and clean up so you can focus on the girls and the ceremony
 - Use a signup method like Signup Genius and make sure to send it out at least 2 weeks ahead of your ceremony
 - Then let them do what they signed up for don't micromanage

Ceremony Tips

- · Courts of Awards, Investitures, Rededications and Bridging
 - · Think outside the box when it comes to supplies or decorations
 - You don't need to spend a ton of money to give your girls and families a meaningful experience.
 - Don't think you need to stick with the "category" someone may have assigned to a ceremony you find
 - Take the ideas and modify them to work for your troop and occasion.
 - · Really celebrate your girls, your troop and their accomplishments!
