

SO YOU WANT TO CHANGE THE WORLD?

Research indicates that the process of earning a Bronze, Silver, or Gold Award significantly improves skills in project management, communication, and problem-solving. By earning a Highest Award, you are preparing for your future while gaining the confidence to make the world a better place.

BRONZE AWARD

Juniors will team up with their troop to make a difference by exploring their community, discovering an issue they care about, and working together to solve it to earn their Bronze Award.

- Eligibility - Must be a Junior Girl Scout (4th or 5th Grade), earn 1 Bronze Award prerequisite, and complete 20 hours minimum (per team member) towards your project.
- Make It Official - Bronze Award Proposals are accepted on a rolling basis. Bronze Award Final Reports are due September 30th of the year you or your oldest team member completes 5th grade.

SILVER AWARD

Cadettes will work alone or with a small group of Cadettes (4 maximum) to research an issue they care about, make a sustainable plan to address it, and take action to earn their Silver Award.

- Eligibility - Must be a Cadette Girl Scout (6th, 7th, or 8th Grade), earn 1 Silver Award prerequisite, and complete 50 hours minimum (individually or per team member).
- Make It Official - Silver Award Proposals are accepted on a rolling basis. Silver Award Final Reports are due September 30th of the year you or your oldest team member completes 8th grade.

GOLD AWARD

Seniors & Ambassadors will work independently to build a team of adults and peers to address an issue with a national-global link to make real, lasting, and sustainable change to earn the highest achievement in Girl Scouting, the Gold Award.

- Eligibility - Must be a Senior (9th or 10th Grade) or Ambassador (11th or 12th Grade), earn 1 Gold Award prerequisite, and complete 80 hours minimum.
- Make It Official - Gold Award Proposals and Final Reports are accepted on a rolling basis for 9th-11th graders in GoGold. For 12th graders, Proposals are due February 1st and Final Reports are due July 1st (after graduation) in GoGold. <https://bit.ly/GSNMTGoGold>.
- Benefits of Going Gold - Standout in college admissions and job interviews, Earn exclusive scholarships, Achieve a higher pay grade in the U.S. military, and Set yourself up for success with higher life satisfaction (personal, education, professional, financial) according to GSUSA Research Institute.

WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN TAKE ACTION VS. COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECTS?

Take Action	Community Service
A long-term project with sustainable and ongoing influence that addresses an issue's root cause	A short-term effort that helps something or someone fulfill an immediate need
Done WITH the community	Done FOR the community
Creating a unique initiative to address an issue's root cause	Joining an existing effort to solve an issue
Creating and leading your own team of volunteers	Joining an existing team, usually as a volunteer
Setting the goals and leading a team to achieve them	Working toward a goal that's set by others



ADULTS, CAREGIVERS & TROOP LEADERS

It's important for Highest Award Girl Scouts to take the lead and practice independence, but they still need support. Adults play an active role in encouraging their Girl Scouts to aim high and make BIG achievements.
